Within the core of this area is The Yorkshire Dales National Park, which was specifically created in 1954 to help protect the landscape and way-of-life in the Dales for future generations to enjoy.

To the east is Nidderdale Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty with its windswept moorlands and tranquil meadowlands – offering the visitor to the Yorkshire Dales a choice of nationally important landscapes to explore.

The Yorkshire Dales are a delightful blend of stunning natural beauty, traditional experiences, fascinating sites and endless ways to pass a memorable holiday. If you are looking for a day excursion or a long-distance tour, the Yorkshire Dales offers breathtaking scenery where rich heritage lies around every corner. It is a place of festivals, pageantry, colourful local markets and a dazzling array of craft shops. Whatever your interests or age, you will find it a unique place to explore, discovering secrets and treasures for years of happy memories.

Travelling around the Dales by coach or minibus allows passengers to relax, unwind and enjoy the scenery of a peaceful and unspoilt environment. By travelling in a group, you are helping to reduce the numbers of vehicles and congestion on the Dales' roads.

The National Park Authority and other local authorities in the area have made available carefully sited and screened facilities for car and coach parking to minimise the impact on the landscape. Please use the coach parks shown on the map so that your vehicle does not cause access problems and congestion for local farm traffic and emergency vehicles. By using the coach parks provided, you will also minimise the visual impact of your parked vehicles on the attractive Yorkshire Dales scenery.






### Planning your visits

For detailed guidelines on planning educational and school visits, please refer to guidance produced by local educational authorities or governing bodies.


- A preparatory visit will assist by checking out background information, accommodation, activities, and study sites.
- Check facilities such as toilets, parking etc for all sites in advance. Try to avoid busy holiday periods and make bookings where necessary.
- Check transport routes to ensure they are suitable for your type of vehicle.
- Remember that most of the land in the Yorkshire Dales is privately owned. Check all rights of way and confirm with land owners that both access and your activity are permissible.
- Thoroughly check safety hazards for all activities. Documented risk assessments are standard practice for many authorities.
- Make sure your party will be suitably dressed, appropriately equipped, and physically fit for the things you expect them to do.
- Prepare for the possibility of poor weather conditions and accidents. Make alternative arrangements well in
- Keep your party to a manageable size and ensure that you have adequate supervision.















































# Group Organisers' and Coach Drivers' Guide to the Yorkshire Dales





### Group Organisers' and Coach Drivers' **Guide to the Yorkshire Dales**

This guide aims to help group organisers, tour planners and drivers to plan visits and excursions to the Yorkshire Dales so that their clients get the maximum enjoyment from the area, while at the same time preserving the area's special

Coach parking has been provided at most of the popular tourist locations within easy walking distance of the main facilities and points of interest. In most cases, toilets are available (some with facilities for people with disabilities) and in many cases, a National Park Centre or Tourist Information Centre is close by.

Parking is usually free for vehicles with over sixteen passenger seats. Group organisers, tour planners and coach drivers can help to conserve the special qualities of the Yorkshire Dales by following the advice given in this leaflet.





# Tips for drivers of coaches and other large vehicles

- Please do not rely on satellite navigation systems to plan
  your route
- Use the hierarchy of roads and advisory one-way systems shown on the map to plan the best routes for your journey. This map has been devised not only to prevent large vehicles meeting but also to ensure that larger vehicles approach narrow bridges from the correct direction to allow them to cross with care. Note: some longer vehicles may find it impossible to cross these bridges if they approach from the wrong direction.
- Please park in designated parking areas or surfaced lay-bys only. Do not park in informal or designated passing places, or in locations that would cause problems for large vehicles.
- Avoid driving on roadside verges as these are often sensitive habitats for wild flowers and are important features in the landscape.
- Consider the use of smaller vehicles if your tour includes the narrower roads in the Dales.
- Drive with extreme care on all roads within the Yorkshire Dales; they are legitimately used by walkers and cyclists as well as vehicles. Farm animals and slow moving vehicles are also frequently encountered.
- Use lay-bys to allow traffic to pass when necessary.

# Categories of roads in the Yorkshire Dales Category 1 roads

Suitable for all traffic. Motorways and trunk roads, including the continuing upgrading of the A59 and A65, that provide a ring road round the National Park and reduce the need for through traffic within the park.

#### Category 2 roads

Suitable for all conventional passenger-carrying vehicles. At a few locations it may be difficult for full size vehicles or large goods vehicles to pass one another. These are secondary distributor A roads (and B roads upgraded to accommodate quarry and other essential access traffic). Since they often pass through villages and contain stretches of steep and narrow road, their capacity is somewhat limited and unsuited to long-distance, heavy, commercial traffic.

### **Category 3 roads**

Width and weight restrictions and physical pinch points will preclude the use of some category 3 roads by full-size coaches

Suitable for coaches outside peak periods only. Likely to be congested on weekends between May and September inclusive and every day in July and August and should be avoided by coaches if possible.

Mini or midi-buses will be more suited to the restricted widths and tight bends encountered on these roads. Where coach tours cannot avoid these roads, drivers are advised to operate the suggested one-way system shown on the map, which should help to minimize conflicts. Beware, however, that this system is advisory only and that on-coming vehicles will still be encountered.

### Category 4 and 5 roads

These roads are unsuitable for coaches at all times due to physical dimension or width or weight restrictions. Steep gradients have not been marked on this map. Some of these routes may be passable with care in a minibus.
